The Grand Finale

Our Husky Basketball team completed the perfect season and solidified its spot in basketball history. Our Huskies (35-0) beat De La Salle (31-3), 70-50, for the CIF State Open Division title in Sacramento. Immediately after the game, conversation broke out about whether this Chino Hills team is the best in California, especially after playing a tough schedule that included the City of Palms Classic in Florida and an appearance at the Spalding Hoop Hall Classic in Massachusetts. Most of those games include huge blow outs by the Huskies. Whether, Chino Hills is the best ever or the best in recent memory, the Huskies were the best for the 2015-2016 season. The huskies faced several challenges across the span of a long season. None of them were like the final game. This

challenge included a rare halftime deficit as De La Salle slowed the pace and led 30-28 after taking a 19-9 lead. This was against our Chino Hills team that tied the state record with 18 games of 100 points or more. Lonzo Ball and the Huskies opened the second half with a 15-2 run and out scored De La Salle 19-5 in the third quarter. The Huskies also held De La Salle to 25 percent shooting in the second half after the Spartans hit at a 50 percent clip in the first half. For Chino Hills, Lonzo Ball had 15 points, ten rebounds, five

steals and five assists. LaMelo Ball had 14 points. LiAngelo Ball had 18 points. Eli Scott added 16 points, and eight rebounds and Onyeka Okongwu had seven points, nine rebounds, and blocked five shots. With the state and national titles taken care of, Lonzo Ball made his way to Chicago that Sunday for the McDonald's All American Game where he dominated once again. The Huskies finished a perfect season with the grand finale—Basketball State Championship!

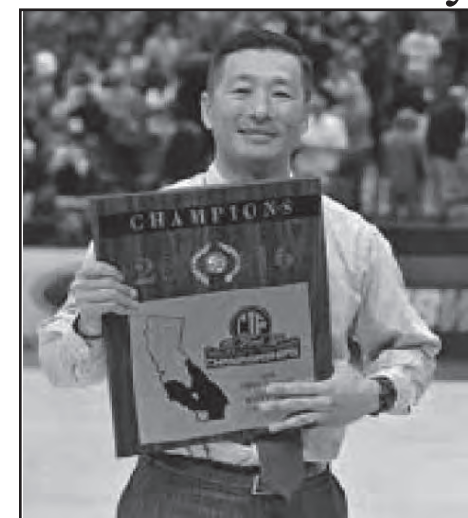
