## **Community leaders visit local schools**

## for Community Principal for a Day

During the kick-off breakfast for Chino Valley Unified School District's Community Principal for a Day on Jan. 27, community leaders were promised a full morning of activities at local schools. For some of the guests that meant a mile run or an encounter with newborn piglets.

The annual event pairs community leaders with school administrators who provide their guests with a close up look at Chino Valley schools' classrooms, programs, operations, and needs.

More than 60 people attended the kick-off breakfast at Liberty Elementary School in Ontario.

During introductions, Nick Montano, owner of Roscoe's Deli in Chino, joked that Chino Hills High Principal Isabel Brenes "worked me so hard last year, that I thought I would get a 1099 (income tax form) at the end of the year." This year, he visited Briggs Fundamental School in Chino with Principal Ryan Cummins.

Magnolia Junior High Principal John Miller said he hoped his guest Michael Cervantes, a district representative for Congresswoman Norma Torres, had his running shoes on because they were going to run a mile with the students that day.

Andrew To, a realtor with Keller Williams Realty in Chino Hills, told District officials that "You are what drives real estate: good schools."

Don Lugo High Assistant Principal John Ashby said his guests Dave and Charleen King of Isaiah's Rock charity in Chino, would get a close look at the new piglets and goats at Don Lugo's Farm, as well as the school's LEAD engineering program.

Lewin Harrison, owner of AACE Financial Services, said his family came to this area specifically because of Ayala High School in Chino Hills. He was to visit Wickman Elementary School in Chino Hills later that morning with Principal Tom Rummell. Harrison said he would love to volunteer at nearby Boys Republic High because he likes the mission of the school and residential treatment center for troubled youth and because the campus is near his home.

Having served as a principal for more than 20 years in the past, Superintendent Wayne Joseph told the breakfast crowd that every day at school is exciting. He said there would be plenty of things at the schools to stimulate the interest and attention of the visitors. The superintendent suggested that guests to the elementary schools visit the kindergartners "because they are so cute," and high school visitors should check out the District's award-winning bands.


"If you are at the junior highs, all you have to do is stand around and you'll be stimulated," he said, chuckling.
