- Provide small group instruction in both ELA, Math, and Designated ELD
- Use Step Up to Writing strategies
- Expect students to speak in complete and complex sentences
- Incorporate "Learning by Doing" in daily lessons
- Provide intervention and enrichment activities
- Provide scaffolding strategies for limited-English proficient students across the curriculum
- Celebrate successes with students
- Be vigilant to outside hurdles that may interfere with the emotional stability of each student which may hinder learning
- Integrate technology into instruction across the curriculum
- Support the character education program
- Support No Excuses University through our classroom universities
