- Describe opportunities for parents to volunteer, observe, and participate in the classroom



- Utilize close reading strategies and Depth of Knowledge questions to enhance reading comprehension
- Use a variety of graphic organizers during instruction
- Provide small group instruction in both ELA, Math, and Designated ELD
- Utilize a variety of student groupings: small groups, pair share, and other partnering strategies
- Use Step Up to Writing strategies
- Provide opportunities for students to use textual evidence to support writing and reasoning
- Use of dynamic projects using multiple disciplines to promote cross-curricular thinking
- Integrate technology into instruction across the curriculum
- Provide intervention and enrichment activities
- Support the character education program
- Support No Excuses University through our classroom universities

At Home

Here are some ideas of how families can support students' success:

- Support your child in studying math facts
- Review homework nightly
- Have your child read 20 minutes daily and ask them questions about their reading
- Model a love of reading at home
- Promote and encourage the use of Accelerated Reader (AR)
- Support your child in using educational websites: IXL, All the Right Type, and Khan Academy, xtramath.org (see school website)
- Help your child prepare for tests
- Attend ELAC (English Language Advisory Council) Meetings
- Attend school-wide events and conferences
- Have your child wear his/her college t-shirt on Mondays
- Look through Rustler folder every Monday
- Stay in communication with your child's teacher
- Talk to your child every day; ask about their day at school
- Visit college campuses and discuss college bound plans and future goals
- Demonstrate a positive attitude about education
